\$208 health fund rise vetoed

GIANT GIANT health insurer MBF has become the first com-pany to have an appli-cation for a premium increase rejected by the Federal Government.

Health Minister

has knocked back a bid
for what is understood

up to \$208 a year for a
family—because it was
too high, The Daily
Telegraph has learned.
Previously, applications for increases
have been approved
automatically.

But the Government is getting tough to pre-serve the benefit of its \$450 tax break for private insurers.

A spokeswoman for Dr Wooldridge said yesterday the fund, the biggest in NSW, had been asked to "rework its sums" if it wanted to ralse premiums for its 280,000 members.

280,000 members.

It is understood MBF had applied for a 15 per cent increase that would have seen premiums for top hospital cover for a family rise by around \$208 a year from November 18.

Neither the fund nor the government would comment on the size of the original application yesterday.
